Description of SENATE VOTES

1. SAME-SEX MARRIAGES (SJR 7) 2005

This resolution to amend the Indiana Constitution states that marriage in Indiana consists only of one man and one woman, and will ban same-sex marriages and same-sex civil unions. SJR7 passed the Senate on February 21, 2005 by a vote of 42-8. It must now be adopted by the 2007 or 2008 General Assembly and then voted on by the voters of Indiana in 2008.

2. INFORMED CONSENT (SB 76) 2005

Senate Bill 76 will require abortion providers to give women seeking an abortion information about the availability of an ultra-sound and the opportunity to hear the heartbeat of their baby. The bill passed the Senate by a vote of 40-8 on February 24, 2005.

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE (SB 332) 2005

Senate Bill 332 will now require that an American flag be placed in every public school classroom and that the Pledge of Allegiance be recited each day and that there be a moment of silence. SB 332 passed the Senate on February 10, 2005 by a vote of 46-3.

4. EXPANDING GAMBLING (HB 1001) 2005

An amendment was offered to House Bill 1001 which would have expanded gambling in the state of Indiana dramatically by permitting up to 2,500 pari-mutuel pull tab terminals at each of the two horse racing tracks in Indiana. The amendment to expand gambling was defeated April 8, 2005 by a vote of 16-33.

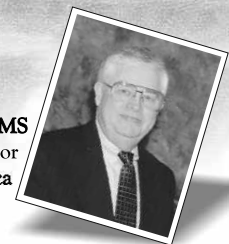

Description of HOUSE VOTES

1. BUDGET BILL (HB 1001) 2005

Previous budgets in Indiana have not been balanced and they spent more than what the state took in. This budget, passed by the House on February 21, 2005, was the first balanced budget in the past several years. It contained no tax increases and the budget would have eliminated the structural deficit in 2007. The House passed the bill by a vote of 52-48 on February 21, 2005.

2. AUDITING THE LOTTERY (HB 1052) 2005

The State Board of Accounts will now be required to annually audit the state lottery. Since the lottery deals with millions of dollars, it only makes sense to have an annual audit done by the State Board of Accounts. The House passed this bill by a vote of 79-19 on February 15, 2005.

3. SAME-SEX MARRIAGE (SJR 7) 2005

This resolution to amend the Indiana Constitution states that marriage in Indiana consists only of one man and one woman, and will ban same-sex marriages and same-sex civil unions. SJR7 passed the House on March 22, 2005 by a vote of 76-23. It must now be adopted by the 2007 or 2008 General Assembly and then voted on by the voters of Indiana in 2008.

4. INFORMED CONSENT (HB 1172) 2006

House Bill 1172 was an attempt to amend the informed consent for abortion law in Indiana. Had the language in the conference committee report become law, then a woman seeking an abortion would have been told that her unborn baby might feel pain when the abortion occurs and that physical life begins at conception. The conference committee report was adopted on March 14, 2006 by a vote of 75-23. Unfortunately, the bill died in the Senate when time ran out on the last day of the session.

5. EDUCATIONAL CHOICE (SB 281) 2005

Senate Bill 281 represented a modest step forward in the effort to empower parents to choose the educational setting for their children. SB 281 would have provided a \$1,000 educational tax credit for one child. Additionally there would have been a maximum of \$2,000 per family. These tax credits were only available to the poorest families. The bill was defeated in the Indiana House by a vote of a 45-54 on April 11, 2005.

6. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE (SB 332) 2005

Senate Bill 332 will now require that an American flag be placed in every public school classroom and that the Pledge of Allegiance be recited each day and that there be a moment of silence. SB 332 passed the House of Representatives on March 28, 2005 by a vote of 86-6.

7. ABORTION CLINICS (HB 1080) 2006

At the present time there are no regulations for existing abortion clinics with regard to the buildings where the abortions take place. House Bill 1080 was introduced in the 2006 session to regulate these buildings. The bill passed the House by a vote of 60-38 on February 1, 2006.
